Cactus Club bids for legality



The Cactus Club, situated on Earsham Street near Heath and Sons Funeral Directors has been closed most of the year. Anwar Suliman and Trenton Wiggins, associates of club owner Castell Fanty, have been working together with the Police to re-establish the premises as a legitimate business.

"We've not only been working with the Police, but the Fire Service, licensing, as well as health and safety departments," adds Anwar Suliman. "Proper architect's plans have been done to enable us to accommodate functions within the building."

"The building will be run by a highly professional security firm that employs male and female security people," explained Mr Fanty. "It will also have state-of-the-art CCTV monitoring systems that, of course, would be accessible to the police. The club will employ up to 30 people – I'm hoping most of them will be from this community."

Jon Ekwubiri, Community Safety Inspector for Burngreave, informed us that the club was closed in January. "Many people will know the Cactus Club by reputation," explained the Inspector. "It's had its fair share of trouble. There have been a series of public order incidents in and around it. We also had incidents of criminals running inside the building to escape police officers. This has led to raids where drugs and alcohol were found. The Club had no licence to serve alcohol or host public events."

Licence faces objections

The Inspector went on to explain that he's been working with the statutory agencies and the owner of the club, "With Mr Castell Fanty, known to many as 'Dakka', and others I've been to six meetings concerning the matter, in the hope we can get the club up and running in a safe way and as a legitimate business. Getting the proper licences is not an easy task and can be expensive. I have invited environmental health and the fire brigade, amongst others, to look at the premises so that a proper submission for a licence can be made. But any of these agencies can make an objection and I can't say any more because the licence request is due in court."

The Cactus Club licence bid will be heard in late October. If unsuccessful this may force Castell Fanty and those who've helped him back to the drawing board. Again this raises issues about the lack of weekend club facilities being allowed to flourish and catering for this large section of our community.

Carwood shop attack

They rushed in without warning. The masked one, wielding a metal bar, struck out with intent to cause harm to the shop's keeper, Robert Dixon. This wasn't a racial or black on black crime, one youth assailant was white and the masked attacker black. Smashing windows and counter displays the sustained attack on the premises continued, with intent on causing destruction and serious bodily harm to Robert.

Robert explained that, fighting back, he realised the first motive wasn't robbery. Requests for contents and the till remained unvoiced until they were leaving the scene. As I left having heard it all I felt angry. Does someone have a notion to gain from forcing Carwood community's most convenient shop to again close down?

Luckily Robert wasn't seriously injured but I believe this could have resulted in Robert being seriously or even fatally injured and two youths facing the prospect of life sentences. As the attackers prime motive wasn't directly robbery – they stole almost nothing from their attack – like others I realise this boils down to someone else's greed and selfishness.

Bowling Green remains closed

In response to residents calls for a better environment New Deal is funding a Green Environment Programme. Last year they also signed a £2 million 3-year deal with the Council called 'Advancing Together', providing extra money to maintain the visible appearance of Burngreave, additional to existing provision. Despite all this, in the last year Burngreave's older generation have lost a valued amenity -Abbeyfield Bowling Green. Rob Smith went out to see to how our green spaces compared to others across the city.

The search for decent park spaces led photographer Carl and myself on a mission across the city. Beginning at Burngreave's Nottingham Cliff recreation ground we made our way towards hilly Osgathorpe Park before entering the gradually deteriorating surroundings of Abbeyfield. Our entrance into Longley Park was in stark contrast as the bowling green greeted us. (This is where this story begins to unfold.)

Longley Park Bowling Green has a full membership and a pavilion building. A big game was in full swing as I entered, and I noticed a six-foot fence protected the green. Mrs Pam Hunter told me she knew what had happened at Abbeyfield as some of their members has joined Longley Park.

Why are young people destroying the bowling greens? It gives pleasure and exercise to so many elder people. Don't they know yet, that one day I will be old and so will they.

The same day, another game of bowls was taking place in Firth Park, Here I met an ex-member of Abbevfield Park bowling group. What the wife of the Presiding Chair of Abbeyfield Bowlers Club, Mrs Maureen Tew, told me gave me cause for concern.

"My husband is 70 and he and others were asked to help by watering the seeds. But they couldn't do it anymore, it took it out of them. Do you know what it takes to water turf regularly enough for bowls Rob?"

"Do you know last week a family were having a picnic here on Firth Park bowling green? The week before a football trainer held a full squad training session on it." explained Maureen.

Later, discussion on this revealed Burngreave Green Environment Programme had laid plans to erect fencing

around Abbeyfield bowling green using BNDfC funding. But what happened to the service paid for by taxpayers that supposedly maintains bowling greens?

In 2003 the Council attempted to reseed Abbeyfield's pitch, but a hot summer meant watering was needed and the attempt failed. A further attempt also failed. Misuse of the pitch was blamed, but no signs were put up to explain what was being attempted. Since then the pitch has been left to

I spoke to Park and Woodlands' Council Officer, Paul Tankard, whose department is responsible for maintaining bowling greens across Sheffield. He said:

"After we seeded Abbeyfield's green Rob, we were short of staff and couldn't find anyone to water the seeds. So Parks and Woodlands asked the members to water it. I'm aware this became too much for them, so I put workers on overtime to do it."

Paul was quick to mention Burngreave Green Environment

Programme funding being in place for fencing around Abbeyfield Bowling Green and added that some bowling clubs across the city are self-managed and maintained.

"Like other clubs, Longley Park and Firth Park financed their own fencing having sought funding. Vandalism and misuse of our greens is a big problem Rob, for which I could put up advisory signs. But without co-operation from the police and environmental services, we'd have a problem enforcing them."



Firth Park puts Abbeyfield to shame

John Clark, New Deal Chief Exec, told the Messenger:

"Abbeyfield bowling green should get re seeded by the end of March 2005 as part of the Green Environment Programme. The plans also include a multi-purpose sports facility where the tennis courts used to be and fencing round the green. I do think the maintenance of the green spaces is awful. Advancing Together doesn't cover parks at the moment, but we are discussing this and the possibility of transferring the budget to maintain the park to Green City Action."

Members of Abbeyfield Bowling Group have shown they are willing to contribute their time and effort to maintaining their green. With all the New Deal funding in place, promising the environment will not only be maintained but improved, how come this well-established and popular amenity has now become unusable?

A lack of respect

The Messenger was shocked to discover the recent damage to monuments in Burngreave Cemetery wasn't due to vandals, but Sheffield City Council's Bereavement Services.

Burngreave Cemetery is the largest green space in our area and for 150 years it has been a sacred place for remembering the dead of many faiths. It is with sadness and some anger that residents have watched the decay of the cemetery and its buildings. The effects of nature and the neglect of our underfunded City Council have resulted in dangerously uneven ground, collapsing graves and unsafe monuments.

However the *Messenger* was surprised to learn that deliberate dismantling of monuments was taking place, not by young people, as many are quick to assume, but by Bereavement Services themselves. A resident of Burngreave for over 50 years, who has several family graves in Burngreave Cemetery, told the *Messenger* how her family grave had been desecrated when the headstone was removed and leant against the side of the grave so it couldn't be read.



"I was so upset, and angry. We have another family grave in Shiregreen and when this was loose we cemented it ourselves. I know that if my Grandparent's headstone had been loose we would have done the same, we visit at least twice a year and my cousin visits every month. I know it wasn't loose, but when I read in The Sun that a council in Wales had pushed over 370 headstones I knew what had happened."



We have an obligation to make the cemetery safe, and in the last year the Health and Safety Commission have raised their concerns with Burial Authorities across the country after several deaths and injuries due to unsafe memorials. We are doing tests in **Burngreave Cemetery to identify** the most dangerous headstones which we have to lay down immediately. This is done by a hand test, if this is passed then by an electronic device which tests for movement. If there is any movement they are laid down face up on the grave by specialist

The resident contacted Bereavement Services to find out why she hadn't been told the stone was loose. They told her they only have the address of her late grandmother, and so couldn't inform her of what was happening. But the *Messenger* has discovered that the damage is being done in such a disorganised way that letters could not have been sent in advance.

Another Burngreave resident, who is often in the cemetery walking her dog, told us she had seen Council workers wobbling headstones and pushing them

"The workers themselves were very considerate in some ways. When testing one of the really old stones the face, with all the writing on, came clean off. They carefully picked it up and brought it into the Chapel for the Friends of the Cemetery to look after and preserve."

The resident went on to complain that it is the general policy of randomly pushing and wobbling stones that is the problem.

"I know they have specialist equipment to test stones and I have seen them with a specialist crane that can lift the headstones carefully and lay them down. But these workers have been told to test stones by hand and inevitably they are being damaged. These stones are full of the history of the people that lived here in Burngreave and it is being lost because the Council are doing things on the cheap."

The *Messenger* approached Bereavement Services with these complaints and spoke to John Batley who told us: Mr Batley denied that stones were being pushed over randomly, "We have staff working systematically on the most dangerous stones until Christmas, but this is part of a five year programme, which will eventually re-erect headstones. We understand that moving monuments can be distressing, for relatives and the general public, if anyone has any concerns they can contact Bereavement Services on 239 6068 or approach our staff on site."

Mr Batley urged our resident to contact him to discuss the matter, and offered to have the stone laid face up on the grave, as it should have been. However, Bereavement Services cannot pay for modern memorials to be mended.

It's a Sure Start

Work on the Sure Start centre is getting underway and it is due to open its doors to the local community in 2005/2006.

The new building, funded by £451,000 from BNDfC and £514,000 from Sure Start, will be built on Spital Street. The centre will house a range of services for families with children up to five years old.

These include:

- A team of Sure Start family support workers and their manager who will provide practical and emotional support to families via referral from professionals as well as self-referrals from service users.
- The family support area cocoordinator who will enhance partnership working.
- The Burngreave Domestic Abuse Project.
- Health visitors and link workers will be based in the building alongside a Sure Start health visitor and midwife.
- A training room with registered crèche.
- · Parenting classes with child care.
- · Family learning.

News in Brief

Funded by BNDfC and working in conjunction with Sheffield City Council's Employment Unit and the Learning and Skills Council, the Burngreave 'Apprenticeship for all' programme will give local people access to city-wide training and job opportunities across a range of sectors including regeneration, retail, mechanics and construction.

The first intake of apprentices are expected to be in place by October and all will leave the programme with at least an NVQ level 2 qualification and hopefully a full time job!

BNDfC itself is also expecting to take

on some apprentices as part of this initiative to give them experience of working within the regeneration field. Trywell Kalyata, Employment and Enterprise Theme Manager for New Deal, said:

"Since the BNDfC programme was established 188 jobs have been created - more than 50 per cent of these have gone to local residents. We take our role as an employer within Burngreave very seriously and want to encourage local people to take up these kind of opportunities and get involved. We are proud to be helping people to develop their skills and gain employment."

Decision time

The Neighbourhood Commissions have recommended to the Council's Cabinet 'Arms Length Management Organisation' (ALMO) as the best way of getting extra investment for Council housing stock. But tenants will get their chance to have their say on the decision, and will receive their ballot papers this month.

Milton Graham, a member of the Commission and Chair of Firshill Tenants' & Residents' Association, was in favour of the move to ALMOs:

"ALMOs will mean we can get new bathrooms and kitchens, and be brought up to the Decent Homes standards. Once that is done there will be enough money in the general budget for regular maintenance. The ALMO will mean we can remain as council tenants, and we want to stay with the council."

But other campaigners are still angry the option of direct investment into housing stock was never even asked. Local campaigner Alison Brown said:

"ALMOs are all about slicing up the housing stock into choosy chunks, hiving off the 'desirable' areas and slowly privatising them. The government admits it has the money available for the investments needed, but are trying to blackmail tenants by only giving it if there is a vote to move away from democratic council ownership and control."

A number of consultation meetings are being held in November prior to the ballot: 1st Nov Roe Lane Social Club 6.30pm, 8th Nov St Peter's, Lyon Street 6.30pm and 17th Nov Verdon Recreation Centre 2.30pm

Community asset or expensive toy?

August 2004 saw the launch of the BNDfC Super Truck vehicle on Ellesmere Green and although fully hyped around the community the turn out was abysmal.

I might have thought it was because the community is tired of launches but as I arrived I saw the chair of our Partnership Board Rose Ardron being told by a local man that the whole thing was a waste of money, a bad design and

"What do New Deal people think they're doing, wasting our money on that," he said pointing to the object that was sat on the green beside a large marquee in a vain attempt to draw attention to itself.

I already knew that £100k had been spent on the vehicle, but was surprised to find out it couldn't be hired out to the community for money and so would

go on needing New Deal funding to keep it on the road. I went to New Deal to find out what was going on.

John Clark, BNDfC Executive Director said: "The primary purpose of the information vehicle is to support BNDfC and local organisations to ensure that local people are aware of and able to participate in activities in the area. However, where there are opportunities to generate income by

hiring the vehicle out to statutory organisations, these opportunities will be taken in order to develop an income stream that supports the vehicle beyond the life of New Deal. Mental Health - it's not Black and White

October 10th is World
Mental Health Day, which
aims to raise awareness of
and destigmatise mental
illhealth and promote
mental well-being. This
month the Messenger
heard from Owen Smith, a
mental health worker and
Trustee of Sheffield African
Caribbean Mental Health
Association (SACMHA).
"Mental health services are
crying out for black
workers," he told us.

Burngreave has the 9th highest level of depression in the city. In 2001 50% of us reported significant stress and nearly 30% were anxious

or depressed. Despite this, we came 21st when it came to accessing support, this may be partly because 41% of Burngreave residents are from minority ethnic communities.

Claims of racial inequalities in mental health services are well established. Research has shown that black men are more likely to be detained against their will, restrained and heavily medicated. The recent inquiry into the death of David 'Rocky' Bennett in a Norfolk clinic, reported psychiatric patients from ethnic minorities face institutional racism.

Since 1988 SACMHA has been supporting African and Caribbean people living with mental health problems, and their carers. They provide supported accommodation and run a resource centre and lunch clubs, as well as advocacy for people in the community, hospitals and secure units. Their new manager, Ashton Wynter, explained they are going through a number of changes, focusing on the quality of their services. He hopes to develop more user participation, "We've got some very astute clients, we want them actively involved in our planning."

Patrick Anyomi, SACMHA's acute advocacy worker, explained their community resources were open to

anyone with mental health problems, "The impression is often that SACHMA is defined by colour, it's not. It's about descent and connections – we bring a cultural perspective that is often missing."

To mark World Mental Health Day SACMHA are holding an event at the Seventh Day Adventist church on Andover Street, 10.30am to 7pm on October 9th, buffet provided. They will be focusing on mental health and spirituality. To contact SACMHA phone 272 6393 or email admin@sacmha.org.uk.

Owen Smith - Mental Health Worker

Owen Smith is passionate about mental health. Ever since his childhood in and around Pitsmoor, he's overcome many obstacles to become one of the few, highly valued, black members of community mental health teams. He has nine children and a grand-daughter, but he still finds time to volunteer at SACMHA. He works with clients to help them back into their community and loves it. Despite suggestions he should move up and be a co-ordinator, Owen says he just wants to keep doing what he's good at.

Everyone has a mental illness in them, the smallest thing can bring it out. I can understand the frustration 'cos of my dyslexia. There's a lot of fear around mental illness, especially for black men. Yeah I've been spat at and abused, but I give people the support they need, "I'm here for you, tell me what you need." I have my own clients and I feel like I'm doing something right!

What was growing up in Pitsmoor like?

No place could beat my childhood. We were four in a big old iron bed in a house on Burngreave Bank. They've been knocked down now, but I remember a Blues club in one of the houses, I wanted to be like the guys in the big cars. I remember having a fear of snow, crawling on my hands and knees up the path to Burngreave Middle School (now Byron Wood), scared that I'd slide back down onto the road.

How did you do at school?

School was horrible, very racist in those times, we were always getting kicked out or put at the back. I stuttered and was in hospital with asthma every summer. I got into trouble with the police as a teenager, but I always wanted to get into mental health work, I just didn't know how.

So how did you start out?

About sixteen years ago, in an old people's home. I still remember working one to one, six days a week for five years, with a disabled man. We got on really well and I saw his behaviour really change. Since then I've worked all over – on psychiatric wards, in secure units, for SACMHA. I had a great experience at Sandy Lee working with people with learning disabilities.

Why do you think black men get such a rough deal from the system? It's because there aren't enough black workers, no one to say "It's a black thing." The system doesn't deal with or understand black culture. Really and truly misunderstandings arise, tempers get lost, leading to fear and more restraint. I was really lucky to get the job at Wathwood, I got good training, but there were no other black staff. I hated parts of it, I felt like a screw. There are lots of black men in secure units, they need help to sort out their problems, deal with their temper and get on with their lives.

So what needs to happen?

We need more training schemes to draw black people into mental health work, give them experience and fight the fear of mental illness.

What would you say to someone thinking of mental health work?

No matter what, stay at school, do your exams, so you can start at the level you want to, not the bottom.



After a hugely successful year for the Creative Burngreave Steering Group and Team, we are pleased to announce that we have met all our targets for artist training, mentoring, and artists funding during 2003-2004.

Our second year, 2004–2005, promises to be equally dynamic. We have already funded 16 projects this year: 3 performance based projects; 2 music projects; the Osgathorpe Jam, One Love Festival; 5 visual arts projects; 4 film projects and the Positive Negative Film Festival. Here's a snap shot of some of the projects we have funded:

Vernon Williams will be presenting Twelfth Night at the Crucible Theatre, with leading Zimbabwean theatre company, Over the Edge.

Matthew Thompkins will be producing a short digital film about a gardener who grows vegetable people at night. This promises to be an eerie drama using dance and music.


Burngreave Photographic Group launched an exhibition of work by Burngreave artists at the Cemetry Chapel.

Cathy Everard is producing a film with local young people, which will detail the leisure opportunities open to them in the Burngreave area. The completed film is to be distributed to schools and youth groups across Sheffield.











The Burngreave Artist Placement Agency, which is essentially a database for artists who live in the Burngreave Area, is proving to be a big hit with artists. This summer we placed 3 artists from our Burngreave Artist Placement Agency, Jennifer Booth, Vernon Williams and Tracey Schawsmidth (all previously on our artist-training programme) as tutors on the media arts summer school.

The youngsters produced 3 films on drug abuse over the summer which will be submitted to the BBC and hopefully screened this autumn, with a second screening at Sheffield's Showcomotion Festival in June 2005.

With regards to how the course went, Jennifer Booth said, "working with individuals from the creative industries really gave them a chance to explore and expand their own creativity".
