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What is the Slice Card?

- A carer must be receiving Carer's Allowance
- Registered disabled with Social Services
- A Blue or Orange badge holder

Proof of eligibility is required. This must include proof of residency, a birth certificate, current bank statement showing that a benefit is being paid or a letter (not more than four weeks old).

A tall storey?

'A beacon shining across the city'. At least that's the hope for new building proposed for the foot of Spital Hill.

While many believe it will never happen, Cherry Tree Development have put forward this 'aspirational drawing', showing a skyscraper towering over Pitsmoor.

The original plan referred to 18 floors of offices, two floors of retail and catering outlets, and residential accommodation on the top four floors, though a reference to the building being 28 storeys high has now been withdrawn from the application.

This proposal is being made alongside other schemes such as the opening up of railway arches to businesses, the revitalisation of the Wicker and the development of leisure outlets and retail along Nursery Street. All these proposals for retail and catering spaces which may be open into the evening could bring stiff competition to existing shops on Spital Hill.

The Council told the *Messenger* they would look favourably on proposals to bring jobs and money into the area, but are unlikely to grant permission for a skyscraper as it's the wrong place for such a building. It is thought the whole



concept may be a red herring to attract investors into the project.

The architects will be presenting their plans at the BCAF Buildings Group on 7th March, 6.30pm at the Kashmir Curry Centre and at the next Quarterly Forum meeting (see advert right).

Pension Credit campaign success

Last autumn, the Messenger reported that a number of local groups were working together to encourage more pensioners in **Burngreave to claim Pension** Credit. So what impact did this make?

We reckon that just under 100 people called in either to Pitsmoor CAB. Pakistan Advice Centre and Age Concern Sheffield about getting Pension Credit. We reckon that another 70 people phoned the advice agencies. Sometimes this was to check that what they were already receiving was right; sometimes because they had been told they weren't eligible; sometimes to arrange an appointment for a benefit check.

Forty-six people attended one of the five outreach sessions. Twenty-one new Pension Credit claims have been made.

A typical example of this is Age Concern Sheffield assisted with a claim giving an award of £36.75 a week, plus back dated payment of £2,276 and Council Tax Benefit of £21.29 a week. Howard Golding from Pitsmoor CAB says: "It's very hard to say exactly how much additional income this campaign has raised for local elders, but it's probably well over £20,000 extra annual income from claims that this bureau alone has handled. We need to learn the hard lessons of how we did this and make sure that as local workers, we don't forget".

Gina Brumby from Age Concern Sheffield said: "We were really pleased to be able to work together with other organisations in the Burngreave and Firvale area to support this campaign. The outreach sessions were invaluable in taking the message into the local neighbourhoods." A final word from Gulnaz Hussain from Pakistan Advice: "Working together this community has organisations that can assist older

people in claiming what they're entitled to. Many of our elders have worked hard in this city and it's only right that they get every penny that they deserve.

However, the Buckenham Street were shocked to read in the **Childcare Consortium** previous Messenger about childcare funding cuts received a reprieve at to Ellesmere Children's Centre, BWRC and the February's Partnership Yemeni Centre. The Women's construction centre currently has contracts with Ellesmere Children's Board meeting. Centre for childcare requirements and deliberately

The board decided to extend funding for 12-24 months until the Council's Early Years service can take over funding for local facilities at Ellesmere Children's Centre and Black Women's Resource Centre. They also agreed to develop a scheme of vouchers to be issued directly to parents to buy childcare places from these groups.

Other projects have not been so lucky. Pleas from the Education Theme Group for New Deal to think again about decisions not to fund projects such as Cellar Space Project, Catch the Drift and the Community Language Schools have fallen on deaf ears. John Clark stated at the consultation event in

Goodison (Centre workers) and students at Women's Construction Centre February: "If New Deal takes this request on other projects could not be funded.'

The funding from New Deal will come to an end for the following projects at the end of March: Burngreave Domestic Abuse Project, Burngreave Language Support Agency, Cellar Space, Community Language Schools, Pitsmoor Credit Union, Yemeni Community Association Capacity Building, Catch the Drift, Safer Homes and Women's Health Screening.

Burngreave Community Action Trust will also run out of money at the end of March. Despite getting a green light from New Deal, they have been told they will not be funded at current levels. Redundancy notices have been sent to ten members of staff.

Forum House sold

Forum House is to be bought by New Deal this month after they were approached by the Council with a plea to prevent it being sold on the open market for upwards of £750,000.

The New Deal Partnership Board were asked to consider purchase of the building for £450,000 in the hope that it could remain in community ownership. They were also asked to consider selling the building back to Black Community Forum (BCF) in several years time. This caused some unhappiness in their February board meeting. Community Rep Ronnie Lewin said: "I don't know what BCF do, a lot of people from the black community do not feel represented by BCF, it feels like a closed shop which only benefits those in the clique." While Community Rep Aisha Special K said: "There will be uproar in the community if we agree to sell the building back to BCF."

The eventual decision was to buy the building out of the existing capital budget, which is set aside to pay for Sorby House and Spital Hill public realm. The Board did not want to give exclusive rights to BCF to buy the building back, but decided not to close the door on any community organisation wanting to take on management of the building beyond New Deal.

New Deal plan to continue renting Forum House to the Learning Campaign. It will also house other New Deal-funded projects: Burngreave Opportunities, Apprenticeships for All, Supporting Business, and Streetworx and they expect the building to generate a profit of £40,000 per year.



Burngreave residents will welcome the start of work on the Vestry Hall this month, as they see workers in hard hats scurrying around the site.

At the same time, with over £10 million of the dwindling New Deal money committed to buildings and other capital projects, some eyebrows will be raised as the programme adds Forum House to its expanding property portfolio, with few details available about how these assets will be owned or run after the end of the programme.

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Redevelopment frenzy

While plans for a skyscraper for Spital Hill are far from reality, other redevelopments are just around the corner.

Work has already started on the Vestry Hall; New Deal has committed funds to refurbish Sorby House and Woodside continues to be discussed. Burngreave Community Action Forum's next meeting on 18th March will focus on these coming changes.

Woodside

Ownership: Sheffield City Council owns the land and while New Deal has invested £930,000 into Woodside, it's still unclear what this has bought them although it did speed up demolition. The Council have decided to sell the land to developers for housing, but the value is still unknown.

Cost: The private sector developer who buys the land will have to fund the redevelopment. No planning permission has been granted as yet.



Plans: The Masterplan, produced by the Council, suggests 150 and 250 housing units will be built to appeal to existing Burngreave residents as well as attract future residents. There would be a mixture of housing built for sale on the open market: housing for rent from a housing association and low cost home ownership. A hilltop square will incorporate the refurbished Pye Bank School, to be converted to residential use. It is undecided how much green space will be retained or how many homes will be housing association and 'low cost'.

The Council will be employing an 'enabler' to assess ideas and proposals from: the Project Group; New Deal; the Masterplan, and other agencies and feed them into the Market Brief for the developer.

Vestry Hall

Ownership: Still owned by the Duke of Norfolk, New Deal has bought a 30-year lease from the Council for £1.

Cost: New Deal plan to spend £3 million on the refurbishment.



Plans: To be made into a Community Learning Centre, but will include a large hall for events.

Sorby House

Ownership: Bought by New Deal from the Council for £686,600.

Cost: Refurbishment is estimated to cost £3–4 million pounds of New Deal money. Costs uncertain until a contractor is taken on.

Plans: To host 80% commercial offices and 20% community offices. From the profit on the rent, about £23,000 is needed to fund part of the running costs of the Vestry Hall. Proposals include meeting rooms for hire, information sections and public toilets, but plans are being revised following a

requirement for contracts to be advertised Europe-wide and revisions are not yet public. Ideas for Sorby House last went out to consultation in 2003.

Public Realm

(Public areas of Spital Hill for example footpaths and Ellesmere Green.)

Ownership: Sheffield City Council.

Cost: New Deal had hoped to spend money on this but uncertainty regarding Sorby House means most of it is on hold. If no funding is found, work could be done by the Council who are working on making the Masterplan ideas happen.

Plans: The only definite work at the moment is around the Vestry Hall where Grimesthorpe Road will be closed and the pavement around the Vestry extended. Work has started to develop the art works for Spital Hill, Sorby House and Vestry Hall, through Sheffield gallery owner, Karen Sherwood, who wants to involve residents in the process. East Sheffield Regeneration Team

The City Council's East Sheffield Regeneration Team is involved in the regeneration of Burngreave, Fir Vale and Page Hall. We work closely with other agencies such as the Planning Department, Burngreave Area Panel, Burngreave New Deal for Communities, Burngreave Business Forum and the Fir Vale Community Forum.

There are currently two Masterplan Project Group meetings, monthly in Burngreave.

- The Burngreave New Housing Group advises on the new housing developments proposed for Woodside, Ellesmere and Catherine Street.
- The Spital Hill Project Group advises on the proposed commercial and business re-development around Spital Hill.

SADACCA celebrates twenty years

On the 26th March SADACCA celebrates its 20th anniversary. The starting point for the centre was in the 50s and 60s when the West Indian Community Association (WICA) was created.

In those days people had nowhere to socialise outside their own homes, feeling unwelcome in pubs and even some churches. WICA members wanted to establish a community centre so a request was made to the City Council for a meeting place which resulted in the allocation of three prefab buildings on the Ponderosa in Crookesmoor (one of them famously known as 'the bug hut'). However two of these were burnt down on Bonfire Night in 1979 and, although housed temporarily in the Philadelphia Centre on West Don Street, the group began to put a plan together to find a building they could turn into a centre of their own.

"We wanted somewhere, not only to meet and socialise in on Saturday nights," two prominent members of WICA told me, "but also a space that would provide educational and employment opportunities for people from our community. We formed a small working party to realise our ambitions. At first we weren't taken very seriously by some of the officers in the City Council. However George Caborn and David Blunkett (then leader of the Council) lent their support and things began to move forward."

Guy Lambert described how they looked at several buildings before finally finding the old Samuel Osborn Steel Works on The Wicker. "It was in need of renovation, however since it's a listed building, the council were keen to see it reoccupied and offered us 50% of the funding. In 1984 we approached the Manpower Services Commission and took on a team of people to work on the building. I had to be really strict with the trainees – they had to get the job done!"

When it opened in March 1986, there were facilities for all ages: a crèche for working mothers, a luncheon club for Caribbean elders, the Bob Marley recording studio, advice workers, community and youth workers, space for small business start-up and social events, even for church meetings. "We employed 73 people in the building!" Guy said. "In fact, at that time, we were running the largest community-



owned project in Europe! We had visitors from Doncaster, London and even Europe and America, all wanting to learn how we had set this up."

Looking back on the last twenty years, what have been the main achievements? "We wanted to do something that would help people to start small businesses or move into higher education," said Guy, "and that's our biggest achievement. SADACCA has been a stepping stone for other projects such as the ACE Centre, SYAC and the Mary Seacole daycare centre. It has given lots of people the skills and confidence to do their own thing and has been a real hub for community projects! Whilst we still need to look ahead to the future, we can be proud that we have all contributed towards this, never mind creating a community centre from a derelict building!"

Thanks to Guy Lambert, Hector and Carmen Franklin, Cora Gordon and Lyn Bent for their time and enthusiasm in telling this story. This is also a tribute to all the people who were involved in the creation of SADACCA, including Ishmail Walters, Joslyn Allen and his wife, Stuart and Isilda Brown, Mr Maxwell, Mrs Buckley-Greaves, Mike and Sue Atkins, Basil Griffiths, Lionel Lambert, Delroy Malcolm, Ken Anderson and so many more whose names are not listed but are not forgotten!

Burngreave Area Panel

Click click to planning info

Planning and development affects everyone in the area. House extensions; people wanting to use a shop as a take away; opening up a car wash; building multi-storey office blocks. Previously to find out more you had to go to Howden House in town and ask to see the planning application. Now on the internet, you can see all current and past planning applications with a few clicks.

Remember, if you don't have internet access, you can use one of the Burngreave Library's seven machines free for up to one hour at a time. They're open daytimes on Monday, Wednesday, Fridays (closed for an hour at dinnertime), and on Saturday morning.

Go to the Council's website at www.sheffield.gov.uk. On the home page, click on 'in your area' in the left menu; then again on 'planning and city development'; then again on 'planning applications on line'. On this page, scroll down to near the bottom where it says 'proceed to planning applications online' and click.

From the menu on the left you can search for applications by their number, look at the history or applications of a particular address, or see what decisions have been made or are coming up on the weekly list. The database also contains applications' supporting documents.

There is now a special map feature that you may find useful. You will need to have broadband access and Internet Explorer for this to work well. And make sure the 'pop up blocker' is turned off – this can be found in 'Tools'. Click on 'view map' in the left menu. This will show a map of Sheffield. Put your icon/crosshairs just to the right centre of the map with the right button on 'zoom in'. Next page, in the centre near a green '4', click again - and again. Now you'll see 'Pitsmoor Cemy' click again on the white area, and again, and now you'll start to see street names, keep going until you see red circles appear, this signifies which properties have applied for planning permission. If you click on 'identify' button, you'll see 'properties and planning applications' in the drop-down menu at the top. Click on – 'planning applications' and put the icon over any red circle, just you will be able to read the planning history of that site.

So using the pan button on the right, go down towards Spital Hill. Here vou'll see one red circle on its own half way down Spital Hill. Click on this and you should see planning application 05/03185/OUT. 'Click to view' on the arrow - click on 'associated documents' - click 'view associated documents' button. On the third entry down - '25/Jul/2005' click on whole doc. And then you'll see five pages of how the local skyline might look. And you can also make a comment on the proposal.

Bus fare campaign

In November 2005, First Mainline, put their bus fares up for the fourth time in a year. An adult single fare went up from £1.30 to £1.50 and South Yorkshire day tickets went up by 50p to £3.50. This represents a 36% price hike in 18 months.



We Want Our Buses

formed in the hope of reclaiming the buses and keeping bus fares affordable. WWOBB is a city-wide campaign with the backing of Council Leader Jan Wilson, who has said: "I want our buses back too!" As part of this campaign a group at the Ashram (the studio behind New Roots) have decided to build their own 'walking bus'. Patrick Amber, community artist, said:

"We wanted something that was fun and positive, something to give our protests a sort of carnival atmosphere. The aim is for the bus to be used at as many protests and meetings as possible."

The idea is for each person to make their own piece of the bus to hold on the protests and to make them all fit together to look like one of the First buses. Although all the basic features of the bus will be the same there is space for people to add their own individual features to it. Others getting involved in the bus protest include the Rebel Clown Army and the Rhythms of Resistance Sheffield samba band. The bus saw its first successful outing at a WWOBB demonstration in the city centre on 25th February.

The Messenger asked local bus users their views on recent fare rises:

"The bus companies have risen fares too high and they do it without warning. I have my hands tied as the buses are my only form of transport so I will have to pay the fare."-No 47 passenger

"I think it's disgusting! I have a free pass from the course I'm on but for other people it's just too high." - Linda Miller, waiting for No 7 on Firshill Crescent

"My Daysaver ticket has gone up by 50p but I have no choice but to use the buses." -Nathiniel Dennis - No 76 bus user

When the Messenger asked First South Yorkshire Ltd to justify the fare increases, Commercial director Brandon Jones said:

"The third increase to fares in November was necessary to meet the huge increase in costs that unfortunately has not been fully met by previous changes. Overall costs have risen by nearly 40% in the last five years partly affected by the global economic situation and the

"As a commercial operator we do need to make decisions from time to time to ensure we cover our costs of operation and return profit to allow growth and deliver a return on the investment our Shareholders make, over half of whom are our own staff. Since 2002, that investment has seen over 100 buses enter Sheffield alone representing over £10 million."






MM Design judging the competition. Firth Park won the competition which means their students will now spend time with MM Design on work experience.

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Building work starts on Burngreave landmark

An historic building in Burngreave is being given a new lease of life with the announcement that work is to start on a major refurbishment programme.

Vestry Hall, on Burngreave Road, is to receive £3 million from BNDfC to turn it into a state-of-the-art community learning and events venue.

A grade II listed building, Vestry Hall was originally built to house the rates collection and registry for the area.

Its restoration, a central part of the regeneration of the whole of Burngreave, has received the full backing of Sheffield City Council.

The building is owned by the Duke of Norfolk estate but has been let to the council on a longterm basis. They have recently handed this lease over to BNDfC so the work can be completed.

The project will include a full structural repair, underpinning, re-roofing, treatment of timbers. renewal of windows, cleaning of stone work and a new first floor and basement. All original and significant features that can be retained and restored will be and substantial new facilities added.

Rose Ardron, local resident and Chair of the BNDfC Partnership Board, said: "The refurbished Vestry Hall will not only offer much needed good quality learning space in Burngreave but it is an opportunity to provide basic skills training for residents."

Councillor Jackie Drayton, Chair of the Burngreave Area Panel said: "The Vestry Hall is a landmark building in the heart of Burngreave. Its refurbishment reflects a great deal of hard work by people in the local community, Burngreave New Deal for Communities and the City Council."

Work is due to commence at the end of February, and will be completed by March

Three of our local lollipop ladies were given awards by the Area Panel in January. Shirley Else who works at the crossings close to Pitsmoor Post Office and Susan Rogers stationed on Barnsley Road help children from St Catherine's and Firs Hill Schools. While Valerie Hanson helps children from Fir Vale School cross Owler Lane and Rushby Street.

Shirley Else



Shirley's been a lollipop lady for 31 years, starting on the Petre Street/Sutherland Road junction before moving to Pitsmoor Road eleven years ago. We went to find out how she felt about her New Year Honour from the Area Panel.

"It was lovely to receive an award. I don't really like a lot of fuss but it's really nice to think that people think that much of me."

When we asked what the hardest bit of the job was, she said:

"You know what that is because you've seen me shouting and getting annoyed when you go up to school! Ignorant drivers! I don't like that bit at all. It can be frightening too – that's why I don't wear long johns when I'm working – if there was an accident and I was taken to hospital it wouldn't be a very nice sight!"

Carrying a lollipop stick has great significance to the job as Shirley explained:

"I didn't have one when I first came to the Pitsmoor Road crossing. Luckily it had traffic lights, but I felt a lot safer when they eventually gave me my lollipop stick. And when I first got the uniform I felt a bit daft, especially in the hat, but it does mean that people recognise you more easily."

Recalling a funny moment Shirley told us of one occasion that she rushed an old woman across the road. "It was quite busy and I virtually carried her but when she got to the other side it turned out she didn't actually want to cross the road at all."

Valerie has been a lollipop lady for over 21 years after being encouraged to apply by a friend.

I asked if she felt the fast moving traffic put her at risk, she said:

"It does seem dangerous, although I've had a number of near misses I've never been hurt.

"Some drivers do not always notice me, I can report them, but the only problems is that they go so quick there's no chance of getting their registration plates. There's definitely more traffic and more children now than in the bast."

We went on to talk about the essential tool of the trade and I asked if she'd ever left her lollipop behind.

"I have never forgotten my lollipop because I usually keep it in Happy Shopper just up the road from the crossing. I've had two lollipops in my career as the first one broke. They can get quite heavy on a windy day."

When I asked if there was anyone in particular she'd like to help across the road she told:

"No one because I like to help everyone cross the road!

"I am very pleased with receiving the New Year's Honour. I took my husband along to the ceremony and met lots of other people. We really enjoyed it!"

Susan Rogers



It is nineteen years since Susan started her job and she enjoys it every bit as much now as she did then. She told me: "I just love working with kids, and this is a great way of doing so."

Susan has experienced many changes to her job since she started, including an increase in the dangers involved.

"The traffic has become a lot busier. Drivers now are not as courteous as they used to be. I would be lying if I said it wasn't dangerous, because some drivers just don't take any notice of me or the lights. There have been times when drivers have gone straight through a red light. You do have to be careful."

Interestingly, she also has not always had one piece of equipment that could be considered essential in her position.

"I didn't always have a lollipop. For half of my career I was just in a plain white uniform and walked out into the road empty handed. I have only had a lollipop in the last ten years or so. And even that has changed recently. It now just says 'STOP' whereas it used to read 'STOP – CHILDREN'. They're now collapsible as well, which makes it all much easier. I've probably had about five or six in my time; I've had quite a few stolen."

Susan is thrilled to have received a Burngreave New Year's Honour.

"I was really surprised. It's lovely. It's brilliant. It really did feel like you're being appreciated."



"Thank you Dr Saleem"

Long-serving and well-respected GP, Dr Mohammed Saleem is to retire on 31st March after serving the Burngreave and Fir Vale community for more than 32 years.



Dr Saleem graduated in Medicine in Karachi, Pakistan in 1967 and came to the UK in 1968. His early ambition was to become an Ear, Nose & Throat Specialist, but he later decided he preferred to become a GP.

After working in hospitals in Birkenhead near Liverpool, Bedford and Nottingham, where he was involved in various roles, he came to Sheffield in 1973 and has served the community ever since.

Things have changed a lot since he started work in a surgery on Rock Street:

"In the early days we had very basic rooms and facilities, but over the years the surgery has developed and now has modern facilities, IT systems and increased privacy for patients."

From Rock Street he moved to 131 Burngreave Road, near the Pitsmoor Methodist Church for twelve years and from there to the Melrose Surgery at 120A Burngreave Road.

The Practice, which has a centre in Shiregreen has over 7,500 registered patients, with 1,500 from the Burngreave community. Dr Saleem has many fond memories of the local community:

"I have myself lived in this locality for over ten years. It is a wonderful and cosmopolitan area and the people are very nice and friendly." In his retirement, he plans to spend more time with his family and to look after his grandchildren. He also wants to do some travelling:

Burngreave Advocacy Now!

A service at the heart of the community!

'Mohammad' has been recovering from cancer which has been especially difficult for him since all his family lives abroad, including his wife. He was separated from his wife just months after their wedding due to war in his home country and now hasn't seen her for seven years. 'Mohammed' has been granted asylum in UK.

Advocacy Now project has been helping 'Mohammad' with issues relating to benefits and health. He wished to visit his wife but had no money. Advocate Kalsoom took the time to write to local businesses and mosques and has now successfully raised £550 for the air fare to make a trip abroad to meet his wife.

Kalsoom told us, "We have been touched by the generosity of people. I approached the takeaways around our office at SADACCA, (Kebbabish, Dixy's, Imran's, Halal Southern Fried Chicken and Lahore Kebab House). Everyone made a donation. The manager at Dixys has been particularly generous, making a personal donation of £150. We also had generous contributions from the mosques we approached (Burngreave Road mosque, Wolesley Road mosque and Sufi centre on South View Road).

The project co-ordinator Fouzia Ali said that raising money for a client is not a day to day activity of the project, "...but in this particular case the client seemed to have no other recourse and we decided to do everything we could to help".

About the Project

Burngreave Advocacy Now! is funded by BNDfC until March 2007. It is managed by Pitsmoor Citizens' Advice Bureau.

The project currently has four half-time paid advocates and one volunteer advocate. Anyone who lives in the Burngreave New Deal area can seek help from them.

Advocates can help over a wide range of issues. They can help with filling in forms, going with you to appointments to put your point of view forward, and helping you with your correspondence.

Advocacy Now! can help if you are struggling to find a doctor or a dentist or a solicitor. They can negotiate on your behalf if you are struggling to pay your bills. They can also refer you to other services which you may not know about.

If you need help you can contact the project by:

- Or by attending one of the project's outreach venues:



Messy play

One thing almost all children love is being messy.



This is where it pays to know how to make a variety of clean(ish) messes. Homemade playdoughs and puttys can be cheap and easy to make, bring hours of fun, and are activities that children and adults of all abilities can enjoy.

These types of sensory play activities enable children to explore familiar and unfamiliar materials in different ways, and can be therapeutic, stimulating, and fun.

Children are often told not to do something because it's making a mess, or they're getting dirty; but Doug Cole, Chairman of The International Play Association, has suggested that not allowing children to take part in messy play, can hold back a child's development.

As playworkers, and parents, we can address this growing trend by making more time for messy, sensory play. It may take a little longer to clean up, and children may get a bit messy, but it's one of the most inclusive types of play and pretty much all children love it.

Recipes

Wet/dry play dough

 $1~{\rm box}~(16{\rm oz})$ cornflour; $1~{\rm cup}$ water; food colouring (optional)

Let children add water to the cornflour in small additions, and mix the ingredients by hand. Add food colouring if desired.

Silly Putty

1 cup cornflour; 1 cup salt; 1½ cups flour; ½ cup water (maybe take more)

Mix together cornflour, salt and flour. Add water and mix.

Joe paints Pitsmoor

"In its entirety, Sheffield hasn't changed a great deal," said painter Joe Scarborough, who has lived and worked in this city most of his life. "It has always been very hilly and not the most fashionable city with its old-fashioned work ethic - if you're not working on a Monday, it feels strange."

Joe has been painting for over 40 years and his work has been widely documented. Not only art work around Sheffield but many other countries like Greece, northern Spain and Ireland.

After the death of his wife, Joe moved to live on a barge currently anchored in Victoria Quays. Here his main focus for drawing has been Sheffield and in particular areas around Pitsmoor and Burngreave where he grew up.

Joe explained about the work currently in progress called the 'Pitsmoor quartet'. This consists of four major paintings based around Burngreave. The 'quartet' includes scenes of Pyebank School and three of his local pubs (Royal Oak, Grapes and Gower Arms) as well as a trip from a working men's club and a wedding ceremony.



As Joe made a coffee, I asked what inspired him to become an artist.

"My father fired my enthusiasm by accumulating his own library of books and pictures. I'd find myself looking at pictures and nothing much else. My father's influence has been very strong as he was a well-known character, socialist and a great self improver."

He also shared with me a favourite quote: "The only way out of Pitsmoor is by the book!" Joe declared, adding

that's he's always used this quote for inspiration.

Beginning working life in the pits of Thorpe Hesley, Joe said that being in the mine without daylight gave him further inspiration to paint, "Everything was brilliant," referring to the effect sunlight had once out of the pit. "For just fifteen seconds it looks like a colour spectrum then quickly it would return to a dirty yard on an autumn day," he recalled. "My heart was then set on becoming a painter and after a mining accident I pursued this ambition and have never looked back since."

Joe aims to have his 'Pitsmoor quartet' paintings exhibited in August and makes a request for old photos from 1946–55 to use as part of
